**A Reflection on Matthew 3:13-17**

Today's gospel marks a pivotal moment in the New Testament, where Jesus's baptism signifies the beginning of His public ministry and the affirmation of His divine identity as the Son of God.

Matthew's account is the only one of the four gospels that has Jesus speak to John prior to the baptism. In this passage, Jesus approaches John the Baptist at the Jordan River to be baptized. John initially hesitates, recognizing Jesus' superiority and expressing his unworthiness to baptize Him. In verse 15 Jesus says, "it is proper for us in this way to fulfill all righteousness." In essence, Jesus says to John, "This is the way that God would have it," and this convinces John to agree.

This moment is significant as it symbolizes Jesus' identification with humanity and His commitment to God's plan of salvation. This is also one of the three times that the Father speaks to us in the Gospel story. Here it is to acknowledge that Jesus is his beloved, the one he loves with a passion. Jesus's baptism is theologically understood as his anointing to ministry and here we are invited to reflect on our own baptism and commitment to following Christ.

It serves as a reminder of the transformative power of God's grace and the call to live in accordance with His will. Just as Jesus was affirmed by the Father, believers are called to embrace their identity as children of God, empowered by the Holy Spirit to fulfill their purpose in life. The Holy Spirit continues to descend upon us, continues to fill us, continues to call us to paths of righteousness through peace. Will we humbly consent to the humble Spirit who guides us in the way of Christ?

Today's reading challenges us to consider the significance of our own baptism and the call to live out our faith actively. As we reflect on this passage, we are reminded of the importance of humility, obedience, and the transformative power of God's love in our lives. Through Jesus' example, we are encouraged to embrace our identity as beloved children of God, called to share His love with the world.

**Saint Anthony the Abbot**

**Feast Day: January 17**



Anthony was born in Egypt in 251. When his parents died when he was about 20 years old, he assumed responsibility for the family's 300 acres and for the care of his sister.

One day at Mass, he heard the words of Jesus proclaimed from this Gospel passage: "If you wish to be perfect, go, sell what you have and give to the poor, and you will have treasure in heaven. Then come, follow me" (Mt 19:21). The passage moved him to action, and he walked out of the Church at that moment and gave away all his property except what he and his sister needed for sustenance.

Later, he heard Jesus' words from this passage: "Do not worry about tomorrow; tomorrow will take care of itself. Sufficient for a day is its own evil" (Mt 6:34). He immediately gave away the rest of their property and entrusted his sister to the care of a convent. He began a simple life on the outskirts of town, embracing only prayer, fasting, and manual labor.

He decided to follow the tradition of the hermits, and headed out into the Alkaline Nitrian Desert region and remained there for thirteen years. When he was thirty-five, he moved even further out of town to live alone in an abandoned fort. He received rations of bread only a few times a year and spoke to people through a crack in the wall. By this time, he was becoming well-known for his faithfulness and wisdom and people sought him out for counsel and healing. Feeling disturbed by the crowds who were seeking him out, he went deep into the desert, where he lived by a small spring of water. His life took on a rhythm of prayer and work, a pattern that continues to sustain monastic communities today.

Anthony died at the age of one hundred and five. St. Athanasius, who knew Anthony and wrote his story, said, "Anthony was not known for his writings nor for his worldly wisdom, nor for any art, but simply for his reverence toward God."
